## Christian Stewards: People of the Resurrection

For those immersed in the secular world, Easter is long over. For the Christian steward, we believe that the Paschal mystery and the life-changing events of Easter are not over. They are not an end but a triumphal beginning, and they have altered us in a quite radical way.

The mystery and miracle of Easter challenge us to live as different people, as people of the Resurrection. What does this mean? For those new Catholics who participated in the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA), a period of mystagogy helps to understand this mystery. Indeed, this ancient Greek word actually means "to lead through the mysteries." Mystagogy is a process of leading (or training) into the mystery. A lifelong journey of growing closer to God and deepening the understanding and practice of the faith. A lifelong process where you and I are still living, learning, growing in and called to share our faith.

During this period, we introduce our new members to service in a quite practical way. Here are the ministries of the parish; here are the charities we support; here are the needs of our community and our congregation. How do you choose to live out your faith in the Resurrection in a quite tangible and real way? How do your gifts fit into our needs? Essentially, however, this is a question that the Easter season calls forth in all Christian stewards not just our newest members.

We have lived through Lent and the Paschal mysteries, all the while trying to deepen a relationship with the person of Christ. The deeper the relationship grows, the more we become rooted in it, the more this relationship with Christ comes to dominate our lives. We no longer compartmentalize Jesus, we hold him at our center. And the mysteries lead us to the fundamental question at the heart of all Christian stewardship, the question that Easter compels us to ask: How do I steward my resources – my time, my money, my abilities and gifts, my very life – so that they are in service to the Kingdom of God? It's not a part-time question. It's not a seasonal question that's swept off the shelf periodically. It's the basic question which the Easter season demands of us: Jesus, how do you want me to serve you?

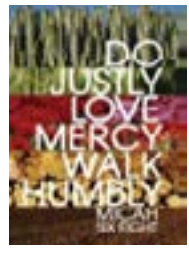

**SOCIAL MINISTRY**

**What is Parish Social Mission?**



The parish is where the Church lives. Parishes are communities of faith, of action, and of hope. They are where the gospel is proclaimed and celebrated, where believers are formed and sent to renew the earth. Parishes are the home of the Christian community; they are the heart of our Church. Parishes are the place where God's people meet Jesus in word and sacrament and come in touch with the source of the Church's life.

One of the most encouraging signs of the gospel at work in our midst is the vitality and quality of social justice ministries in our parishes. Across the country, countless local communities of faith are serving those in need, working for justice, and sharing our social teaching as never before. Millions of parishioners are applying the gospel and church teaching in their own families, work, and communities. More and more, the social justice dimensions of our faith are moving from the fringes of parishes to become an integral part of local Catholic life.

Our parish communities are measured by how they serve "the least of these" in our parish and beyond its boundaries-the hungry, the homeless, the sick, those in prison, the stranger (cf. Mt 25:31). Our local families of faith are called to "hunger and thirst for justice" and to be "peacemakers" in our own communities (c Mt 5:6,9). A parish cannot really proclaim the gospel if its message is not reflected in its own community life. The biblical call to charity, justice, and peace claims not only each believer, but also each community where believers gather for worship, formation, and pastoral care.

*(Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults)*



Throughout the history of Christianity, people of all faiths have found their way to the Catholic Church. The Rite of Christian Initiation for Adults offers a program of faith formation for adults that will prepare them for full initiation/communion into the Catholic Church at Easter.

Our RCIA team is dedicated to serving the church by guiding our inquirers in the Catholic faith from the first steps of entering into our faith to the beginning of their life with our Lord Jesus Christ and after. The RCIA journey begins in August as we begin our weekly informational sessions that will prepare and equip those who desire to be initiated and are brought into full communion with the Catholic church through the sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist on Easter Vigil (Saturday before Easter Sunday).

The journey continues as we encourage the newly baptized Neophytes to start getting involved in our parish community so that they may continue to grow in faith along with their newly gained family from our parish community. Through the RCIA process our team help and guide the newly baptized Neophytes to ministries that they may be interested in depending on the many gifts and talents they exudes. With the continued support and prayers from our parish community, we can only hope for the continues growth of our Co-Cathedral of St. Theresa Ohana.

**Second Sunday of Easter/Divine Mercy Sunday - April 22/23, 2017**

In today's first reading, the four activities of the earliest church are introduced to us as priorities of the church: devotion to the teachings of the apostles, communal fellowship, the Eucharist and prayer. The early members of the church saw themselves as devoted stewards of these activities. These were not options. They were the fruits of a genuine conversion to a life in Christ. Sharing in the Eucharist was the most intimate expression of fellowship, while the most common expression of fellowship in the New Testament was that of sharing financial resources – giving. This was not a perfect community, but one that gave evidence of God's active presence in its midst. This early community offers us an excellent example of how to better exercise stewardship in our own parish families.
